The Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge is part of a wetland acquisition program to preserve valuable wildlife habitat at key locations along waterfowl migration routes. When completed, the refuge will consist of 7,435 acres of salt marsh and adjacent fresh water habitat. The refuge was established in 1966 and named after Rachel Carson in 1970. It is one of only 3 (out of 508) refuges named for women.
